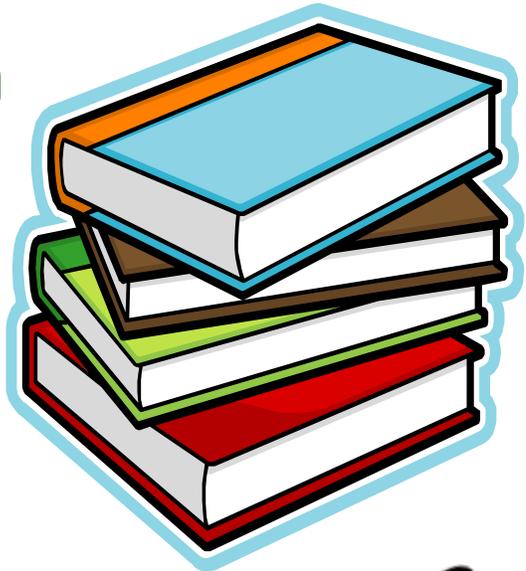

Suggestions and Tips

This resource can be used in a variety of ways. One popular way to read different genres is to spread them out throughout the school year - doing a different genre each month or so. Students will soon know what is expected and things should run smoothly by the second or third book. Here are some other suggestions for tailoring this resource for your students:

- If completing both a book report and a project is too overwhelming for your students, consider choosing one or the other. There is plenty to be gained by just doing the report or the project.
- Allowing time for students to share their projects with the class is a great way to reinforce their hard work. However, if you do not have time for everyone to share, you could split your class into several small groups and have students share with their groups. Invite aids and parents in to watch presentations so that there will be several adults.
- The tracking sheet and the project organizer are both great tools for keeping track of everything that must be done. For younger students, you may want to fill in the dates on the tracking sheet before printing them out. For older students, writing in the dates will help to reinforce them.
- You may want to allow students to propose their own projects if none of the four in the grid appeal. Students who their own projects should do so in writing and get teacher approval before beginning.
- As a fun little extra, at the end of the document, there are some book templates with the names of the genres already printed on the spines. As students complete the different genres, they can fill them out, color them, and put them on a class bulletin board. Soon your board will be full of books!

In order to facilitate exploration of the genres, both the guided book reports and the projects on the project choice grids have been tailored for each genre. For example, the Historical Fiction report focuses more on the setting, while the Mystery report focuses more on plot and the Realistic Fiction report is focused more on the main character.

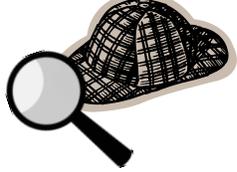

Fantasy Book Projects



Choose one of these projects to complete at home

Fantasy Map

Create a map of an important setting from your book. Your map may be created from salt-dough and painted or you may make it on paper with colored pencils.

Label at least ten important places on your map. On a separate piece of paper, tell why each of the places you labeled is important.

Mythical Creature Model

Use modeling clay, Paper Mache, fabric, or another medium to create a model of a mythical creature from your book. Make your model as realistic as possible.

Then write a paragraph describing the creature and the role it had in the story.

Fantasy Poem

Songs and poems are often a part of fantasy books. Write a poem about some aspect of your book. It can be about a character, an event, the setting, or about the whole book.

Your poem must be at least 20 lines long and must rhyme. Illustrate your poem.

Movie Poster

Pretend that your book is going to be made into a movie. Create a movie poster to advertise the movie. Your poster should include the title of the book, a large picture, a brief summary that does not give the ending away, and the names of two or three actors who will play (or voice if it will be animated) the main parts.

If your book is already a movie, make sure your poster looks completely different from the real one.
